A Measure of Happiness

In a study prepared by the UBS Wealth Management, which I came across, I couldn't help wondering if all our members are aware of how very lucky they are for living here in Switzerland. The study was conducted by a team of economists over a period of two months earlier this year. As 2013 approaches the number of political, economic and financial crises all around us seem to keep on increasing but the findings of this report will surely raise yours spirits.

This report was first published in 1970, and has been updated ever since every three years. Surveys on prices, earnings and a host of other indicators are conducted in several cities in Europe, America, Africa, Asia and Oceania. The huge amount of data gathered is used to get a broad idea of how people make their living and how hard they have to work to achieve a, so called, "modern world" living standard. As may be anticipated, the conclusion was that people living in Asia work considerably longer hours, than their counterpart in Europe, but earn significantly less on average.

Altogether 72 cities from around the world were surveyed, using independent observers with more than 50'000 data points collected and analysed. In order to make the data meaningful and comparable (normalised), a basket of goods including 122 different items was chosen. The items were selected on European consumer habits. In order to work out the effective cost of living, the individual positions in this basket were grouped into nine consumption categories. These form the basis for calculating the effective cost of living, as shown in the table below. The percentage figures refer to their weight for the final result:

Food/Groceries	14%
Beverages/Tobacco Products	5%
Hygiene and Healthcare	8%
Clothing	7%
Household and Electronic Dev.	10%
Home	10%
Heating/Dining	6%
Transportation	16%
Misc. Services	24%

Starting with Price levels, it is not a big surprise to see Oslo, Zurich and Tokyo are the most expensive cities in the world. Geneva, Copenhagen and New York follow. Prices of goods and services are lowest in two Indian cities of Delhi and Mumbai. Oslo and Zurich are about 20% more expensive than Western European price levels and Tokyo is 50% more expensive than the majority of cities in Asia.



The price levels in Africa and Oceania are relatively uniform. Furthermore, the prices across the whole spectrum from top to bottom have not changed significantly from those taken three years ago. However, the rankings in mid-range have changed due to changes in inflation and exchange rates. For example, in cities like Auckland and Sydney the price levels increased in US Dollar terms due to appreciation of local currency against the US Dollar. Moscow is another such case, where price levels increased due to appreciation of the Rouble. On the other hand Dublin experienced a relative decline in the price index due to the financial crisis in Europe. For the data to be meaningful, however, the level of wages in all the places where data was collected has to be taken into consideration as well.

The wage level index is calculated on the effective hourly wages for 15 professions. Once it is taken into consideration the picture changes dramatically. For example the price level difference between a city near the top and one near the bottom is a colossal 16.5 times (1650%). However, once the wages are taken into consideration the gap drops down to 3.33 times (333%). In other words a worker from the bottom has to work 3.33 times longer to buy, for example, a big Mac than a worker doing similar work in a city near the top. The top five cities with similar price level indices are Zurich, Geneva, Copenhagen, Oslo and Luxembourg, and bottom five are Kiev, Nairobi, Manila, Delhi and Mumbai.

Comparing Wage levels among different continents expounds shocking differences. The largest wage differences are in the fastest growing region of the world, Asia. The wage levels in Tokyo are twelve times higher than the lowest, Delhi. Wages are closest in North America, with wage levels in New York just 1.3 times higher than Montreal. The wage levels within Europe are quite surprising. The difference between Western and Eastern Europe is four

Due to fewer salary deductions, Switzerland is better than its peers in Western Europe. Surprisingly, that in spite of all the economic problems and crises, Athens is still ahead of cities like Moscow, Istanbul, Prague and Rio de Janeiro. Also Dublin, another severely affected victim of the economic crisis, is right

below Amsterdam and Paris and above Toronto and Montreal.

times on average.

Naturally, looking at prices and wages alone does not reflect the overall picture, especially living standards in any particular city. Domestic purchasing power has to be taken into consideration as well. Copenhagen has the highest purchasing power in terms of hourly wages, followed by Zurich, Geneva and Los Angeles. Taking annual income as the benchmark, people living in North American cities can afford to buy the basketful of goods on average twelve times

per year, compared to just under ten times for those living in Western European cities. Eastern Europe and South America can only afford to buy the basketful fewer than five times annually. It can be concluded, therefore, that a family of three is dependent on more than one wage earner. With the domestic purchasing power taken into consideration, the top of the list remains the same once more and so does the bottom of the list, with cities like Mumbai, Caracas, Delhi, Kiev, Nairobi, Manila and Jakarta having the lowest rankings.

Additionally, since our lifetimes are finite, we all want to utilise what time we have efficiently. Let us therefore take an example: how long does one have to work in order to buy, let us say, an iPhone in the various cities. Most of you have an iPhone and know the answer at least in this part of the world. According to the

study it takes only 22 working hours in Zurich on average, whereas it takes up to 35 hours in North America, 42 hours in Oceania and 48 hours in Western Europe. In Mexico City and Bucharest it takes ten times longer than in Zurich or 220 hours, with Manila topping the list at 435 hours. People living in Africa, South America and Asia need to spend three weeks' salary (assuming 45 hours week) in order to buy an iPhone.

Further interesting details are revealed when we consider the cost of clothing. The cost of a complete wardrobe in Manila, an attractive shopping destination, is only US\$ 410. A wardrobe for men or women is meant

> to consist of a suit, blazer/jacket, dress, a pair of jeans, shirt, trousers and two pairs of shoes. If department store price tags are used, then the cost would be US\$ 140 for women and 270 for men. The same outfit would cost seven times as much near the top of

the index. Generally, Africa and South America are the cheapest for buying clothes, with Western Europe and North America being the most expensive. In Zurich for example the same outfit costs US\$ 1'100 for men and 1'190 for women. Interestingly. Rome is the only city where women's clothing is more expensive than men's (US\$ 910 and 830 respectively)

Conspicuously absent in the above comparisons are the costs of housing, public transportation, home electronics, household appliances, hotels etc. Due to space limitations they shall be the subject of a second article in the next issue of the Newsletter

It is clear that Switzerland scores tops on every issue which justifies my claim that we are very lucky and privileged to be living here. With this note, I like to wish you all a merry Christmas and a happy New Year.

Exoplanets and Space Telescopes

Our understanding of the objects filling skies be they neighbouring planets and moons, our sun the stars, galaxies and indeed the whole universe is based on observations in mostly the visible spectrum of the electromagnetic waves. With the discovery of radio waves, the skies were additionally observed in the radio range of frequencies as well as in the microwave and infrared range.

Of course apart from the naked eye, telescopes are used as far back as Galileo Galilei who was the first to point a telescope at Jupiter and discover its four largest moons. Nowadays, there are telescopes placed in locations where visibility is good and optical pollution is low, usually at the top of mountains, e.g. in La Palma, Canary Islands at 2400 m or in Mauna Kea, Hawaii at 4123 m, etc.

Earth bound observations have intrinsic disadvantages. To mention a few: since the Earth is in constant rotation, to observe a certain area in the sky would require continuous compensation usually done by mounting the telescope on an axis parallel to the Earth axis (one end of the axis should point to the north star) and rotating the telescope in the opposite to the Earth rotation. Additionally, the Earth atmosphere which has constant turbulence interferes with the very weak light signals coming from remote parts of the sky. Furthermore most locations are polluted with stray lights from big cities and centres of populations. The biggest disadvantage, however, is the fact that observations can only be done when the sun is below the horizon. Half the time is lost waiting for the sun to set.

With space travel becoming a reality and after man went to the moon and back, the idea of observing the skies from space, away from the atmosphere and other limitations, was born. The Hubble space telescope was launched in 1990 at a cost of \$ 2.5 Billion. Its orbit is equatorial nearly circular low Earth orbit. Its height above Earth surface is 559 km and has an orbital period of just under 100

minutes. Its diameter and the size of its reflection mirror is 240 cm, and can observe the skies in visible light, as well as ultraviolet and infrared waves.

The Hubble Space Telescope was designed to be repaired and overhauled in space. Indeed it was overhauled and repaired a couple of times but is still going strong. Thanks to Hubble the astronomers have been able to discern the farthest galaxies in the Universe going back to within a few millions years after the big bang, or the instant in time when the universe was created, some 18 billion years ago. In other words, the light has taken that long to reach us, so we see them as they were then at the time they were being created.

Are we alone?

Not only understanding our Universe has been at the core of human inquisitive mind, but the more pressing question has and shall always be are we alone? The search for extra terrestrial life has been central for most of us for a long time. Apart from the untold science fiction novels and film.

Many of your would know about SETI, or at least you would remember what the acronym means, <u>Search</u> for <u>Extra</u> <u>Terrestrial</u> Intelligence. SETI was set up in 1984 to explore the Universe for any sign of life. One of its best known activities is the exploration of the radio spectrum in the skies, for any abnormal signature that might lead to an intelligence of some sort. At one stage they requested volunteers to allow the computing power of their computers to help analyse the deluge of data which they collect daily. I remember in the 90'ies I used to keep my computer on the whole night, so that it could be used by SETI. (Check setiathome.berkeley.edu).

The sceptics, who think that we are alone, argue that if there were extra terrestrial life. then the odds are it would be much older than ours and it would have left some signature which radio astronomy should have found. That SETI after 30 years of intensive search had found nothing is an indication that we might have to accept that we are alone.

However, at the turn of the century, with improved instruments and better analyses, the thinking about extra terrestrial intelligence shifted. Rather than search the radio spectrum at random for a signature, we should focus our attention on areas of the sky where life is possible or probable. In other words we should be looking for planets which are at the right distance from their stars to allow water to exist in its liquid form.

Observing planets on distant stars is extremely difficult. In fact direct observation is simply not possible. Indirectly, however, it is possible to find such planets. Two indirect ways are used to find such planets, if the orbit of the planet is in line with the Earth, then the brightness of the star shall dip when the planet comes between Earth and the star, otherwise if the orbit is perpendicular to the Ine of sight, then a slight wobble of the star due to the rotation of a planet around it, can be detected. Altogether over one thousand such planets have been detected, out of which at least a dozen or so are orbiting in the inhabitable range. The word Exoplanets has been coined for all such planets.

The quest for finding extraterrestrial life has not stopped at the exoplanets. In our solar system there are at least two celestial objects which might harbour some form of life. These objects are moons of solar planets. Europa is the second Galilean moon of Jupiter, and is thought to be covered by ice. However, below the ice, liquid water might exist, and is kept warm by the tidal forces generated from its huge mother planet. Encladus, is the second moon orbiting Saturn, and is known to have a guyser near the south pole were a plume of water erupts, and falls as snow. In spite of its small size and low surface temperature and the fact that it is locked to its planet (like our moon), still astronomers believe that tidal forces can generate enough heat inside it to support some form of life.

So, now the search must be extended not only to exoplanets but also to 'exomoons'. But how can this be done, since Hubble has been pushed to the limit of resolution to observe wobbles of stars only.

James Webb Space telescope

The revolutionary idea about launching another telescope into space, but not to orbit Earth, instead it should orbit the sun was born sometime ago. It should be far enough from Earth not to be affected by its rotation but not too far so that it could be controlled easily.

One of the interesting freak properties of the Sun-Earth system is that there are five so called Lagrangian points in which a celestial body shall orbit the sun synchronously with the Earth. In the illustration shown, you can think of L1 as the point where the Earth gravity neutralises the sun's, so an object there, shall stay there, at least theoretically. Intuitively, we know that this point L1 is not stable, because any perturbation in the position of the object shall cause it to drift away. It is like a ball on top of a hill, any perturbation and it would roll down. However,

L2 is semi-stable, meaning any movement away from it would cause it to return to the point, i.e. going back to our analogy, the ball is now in a valley, if it moves away from the lowest point it shall return back to it.

This is exactly where the James Webb telescope is projected to be at the Lagrangian point L2. The distance to Earth is about 1/100th the Earth-Sun distance, reflecting the proportion of their masses. Considering that the distance between Earth and sun is 150 million km, L2 would be about 1'500'000 km up or almost four times further away as our

up or almost four times further away as our T


moon is from Earth. A rocket launched from Earth would take about a whole month to get there.

If all the ambitious plans for it were to be realised, then it shall be in a position to see exoplanets and deduce from their wobble if they have moons. If such moons have atmospheres with traces of oxygen in it, then the odds would be that life might exist out there.


The James Webb telescope is due of for launch in 2018. It shall be

optimised for infra red waves and shall have a huge sun shield in order to keep the detectors at a very low temperature to reduce thermal noise. Its primary mirror is 6.5 metre in diameter. Compared with Hubble's 2.5 m mirror, the collection area is almost seven times larger.

Indeed, we have come a long way from the SETI days and most augurs predict that within the next 20-30 years we should know if we are alone or not, at least within a sphere of up to 20-30 light years away.

Krav Maga as I experienced it

I. My First Steps into the World of Kray Maga

Facing separation from the ex-wife in 2010, all of a sudden I felt totally alone. Many of you would know the feeling; the whole world was coming to an end. The fact that I had a fairly successful business, with a full work schedule, didn't help and this feeling was haunting me all the time. Previously, I was quite active, doing a lot of sport and having many outside interests, but now I became lazy, watching television or videos most of the time and doing little else.

Once, while watching TV, a presentation of a Krav Maga session caught my attention. I went on the Internet and found a few places where this art was practiced and taught. It didn't take me long to find a training centre not far from where I was living in Lausanne, EIKM (Ecole Internationale Krav Maga) in Mies on the lake of Geneva. With mixed feelings I enrolled for a preliminary period of 3-months.

On my first encounter, I was pleasantly surprised by the "boss", Philippe Kaddouch (PK). He simply suggested that I should come for one or two lessons free of charge. Later, I discovered that this was a trick to find out whether I was truly motivated or not.

It was refreshing to know that the most important thing was not to dress up like a warrior or learn some strange martial arts' katas to imitate those Asian movies, but to learn about ourselves: how to react to an abnormal situation and get the best from ourselves without having to wear special clothes. It was therefore quite a surprise when I asked PK what do I need in order to attend the course, he replied, "your daily clothes". Furthermore the training room had no mattresses and looked like any other normal everyday room.

After a few lessons I was having such a good feeling, that I decided to enroll in the course and was attending five times a week. Through the course of training, I met with some nice people who were also looking to improve their behavior in everyday life rather than trying to imitate a Bruce Lee.

I must say that, as a result, my spirits started to improve and the depression quickly disappeared. Furthermore, I was able to correctly analyze my situation in terms of professional activity as well as in terms of family and other private affairs.

This article is a tribute to my coach who taught me Krav Maga and protected me from using drugs, alcohol etc. He helped me overcome my difficulties and pass through a

critical period of my life. I would like to share my experience and show that Krav Maga's approach enables you to be mentally much stronger, and at the same time enjoy a nice collective sport.

II. The Objectives of the PK Method

From my experience, I consider the PK method suitable for everyone, irrespective of age, sex or level of body fitness. He teaches self defense and how to face aggression both from the technical and physiological points of view.



It is of fundamental importance to develop the right physical techniques and to acquire the correct mental approach. As a result, the reaction to obstacles and decision-making improve, and consequently self-confidence improves as well,

III. Personal Development

The PK's method had resulted in developing and asserting my physical and technical capacities and capabilities. Even my character and personality were asserted. Furthermore, it enabled me to retrieve my basic instincts and be able to make quick, and assertive, decisions when facing complex and risky situations. With hindsight, all such decisions proved to be optimal. The development of such skills was only possible through the essential support of the PK method.

It was the sensation of rediscovering the person I never dared to be any more, both in my professional activity as well as in public or in my private life. In fact, the Philippe's method is based on three elements: the fighting method he teaches, the psychology and the authenticity.

IV. Biomechanics

Though rough at the beginning, no other self-defense or fighting system is as effective and at the same time refined in its intelligence and subtlety as Krav Maga. Philippe has refined this discipline to such a level that only he can put it across. It is no longer Krav Maga, but the future of it: the "PK method" which belongs to him only.



Improving your fitness level wherever it may be, allows you to reach a better potential to carry out the basic or advanced techniques taught by PK. These exercises are drawn from practices in gymnastics, athletics, and other such disciplines of the past. They are very effective and much more useful for the body than the majority of exercises practised in a gym.

As much as any sport the PK method engages all the muscles and joints of the body in all of their planes of mobility. The stretching exercises are adapted to the same objectives.

V. Psychology

Learning how to defend oneself and how to react, requires instinct, aggressiveness (not to be confused with violence), reaction and self-confidence. The PK method include conditioning or reconditioning reflexes as well as dealing with an aggression in order to be able to react in an adequate way to each hostile situation, whether it is physical or psychological.

VI. Authenticity

In certain situations in life, one works without a protective net, so the smallest error could result in disaster, an injury or even death. In such a case there is no room for hazardous techniques. Realistic training gives you the right reflexes and the right moves required in a real life situation, without excessive confidence. No need to lie to yourself, when you are in the training place, you do not come for who you are but for who you are going to be. This is the secret of the success of Krav Maga as taught by Philippe.

VII on Philippe Kaddouch

- He is one of the best known self-defense expert worldwide.


